### **COMING NYFOA PROGRAMS**

### Forest Property Taxes, March 31, 7:00 p.m.

This meeting will feature two approaches to the reduction of property taxes on forested land. DEC Forester Gerry Kachmor will discuss the New York State Real Property Tax Law 480a, which provides up to an 80% reduction in property taxes for forestland committed to long-term, sustainable management for timber production. Fred Von Mechow, DEC Program Coordinator for the Rogers Environmental Education Center, will discuss Conservation Easements, which can provide deductions from ordinary income taxes as well as reductions in property taxes on committed forestland. Both speakers, plus members having experience with these programs will be available to respond to individual questions, and handout materials will be available. This meeting will be held in the auditorium at Cornell Cooperative Extension of Broome County, 840 Front Street, Binghamton. (one quarter mile north of Exit 5, Interstate 81, next to Applebees). Doors open at 6:30, meeting begins at 7:00, public is welcome.

### Movie Night – "The Greatest Good", April 22, 7:00 p.m.

Come and see this two-hour film produced for the Centennial of the U.S. Forest Service. The film covers the budding conservation movements during the period from 1864 –1910, the founding and organization of the U.S. Forest Service under its first Chief, Gifford Pinchot, and the political, social and economic forces that have shaped national forest policies and practices over the last century. The film includes historical footage of logging operations, forest fires, CCC camps, and interviews with active and retired employees of the Forest Service. Seeing this film would be a good prelude to our bus tour to Grey Towers. The film will be shown in the Lawrence Conference Room at CCE Broome County (directions above). # **Grey Towers National Historic Site, Bus Tour, May 21**

Many members have suggested this tour, so here it is! Grey Towers is the ancestral home of the Pinchott family, located in Milford, Pa., about two hours from Binghamton. Gifford Pinchott, the first Chief of the U.S. Forest Service, and twice Governor of Pennsylvania, lived and entertained countless national and international political leaders at Grey Towers. The program will include a one-hour guided tour of the mansion and surrounding gardens, a one-hour, one-mile guided tour through the adjoining 100-acre teaching forest, and time for other optional walking tours and the gift shop. ### Woodswalk, July 11, 1:00 – 4:00 p.m.

Ray is a retired DEC expert on wildlife and wetlands, and a long-time NYFOA member. The walk will include a stand where timber stand improvement was completed eight years ago, a stand recovering from a previous higrade harvest, man-made and natural wetlands, and examples of best management practices for soil conservation and enhancement of wildlife habitat.

#### **Forest Invaders!**

Preparing for the Big Three Invasive Insects: Emerald Ash Borer, Hemlock Wooly Adelgid and Asian Longhorn Beetle.

Our forests are at risk from imported insects, diseases, and weeds that have no native predators to keep them in check. These three insects will change the face of our forests forever; destroying all of our ash trees, knocking back our hemlock population, and potentially devastating our most common treessugar maple and red maple.

We'll cover what these invasive species are, where they came from, where they are now, and what forest owners and general citizens can and should do to be prepared. This two-hour program will be offered on two different dates and locations.
