Dr. McGowan is also interested in tropical mammals and has employed his tree-climbing skills to participate in research on canopy mammals in Panama and Costa Rica. He is an accomplished wildlife photographer and some of his photos and additional biographical information can be found on his website at http://www.birds.cornell.edu/crows/ Dr. McGowan co-edited the "Second Atlas of Breeding Birds in New York State", and his talk will cover the 20 year research and surveying effort that led to its publication.

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RESTORE NEW YORK WOODLANDS (RNYW) Woodswalks Scheduled for May, 2013.

The campaign has been named "Restore New York Woodlands" (RNYW) and will include simultaneous woodswalks throughout the state during the weekends of May 11-12 and May 18-19. Your Southern Tier Chapter Steering Committee and area Master Forest Owner Volunteers are planning separate woodswalks for Broome, Chenango and Delaware Counties. Members of other organizations with an interest in natural resources, politicians and the media will be invited to attend so they can learn about the threats to our future forests and the RNYW campaign.
