Twenty NYFOA volunteers signed up to staff our display throughout the week, working shifts of 3 to 6 hours duration. In addition to our traditional table top display and wood sample ID quiz, information relating to many other forest related issues was available, including Cornell's MFO program, the Forest Connect Fact Sheet Series, invasive species info and much more forest stewardship information.

Thanks to the artistic skills of Tony Pingitore and Dan Anderson, our Chapter raffled a super-custom Eastern Hornbeam walking stick and a pair of mugs with a custom mug hanger. 1st Prize in the raffle drawing went to Colleen Day, daughter of AFC member and MFO volunteer Paul Marohn. Game of Logging / Level One Training

On Saturday, November 6, 2010, we hosted a Game of Logging, Level One training session. The instructor was Bill Lindloff of Bill Lindloff's Procuts. There were nine of us in the class. Experience ranged from raw novices to some who have been cutting wood for decades and those somewhere in the middle. We had four young men in the class, one a senior in high school and three recent grads.

The day started out in my shop with emphasis on Personal Protective Equipment (PPE), safety features on chainsaws and proper sharpening of the saw chain. We old timers found out that some of our safety equipment was inadequate or its useful life had expired. Did you know that a chainsaw helmet has an expiration date? The helmets are considered unsafe after five years! After taking some licks about our equipment and our sharpening skills we headed out to the woods.

I had flagged a number of ash trees to use as our victims and after a demonstration from Bill and some practice cuts on short logs we were each paired with a tree and had to plan how to cut it safely and drop it where we wanted it to fall. HELP is the acronym for Hazards, Escape, Lean and Plan. Before we could start our saw we had to 1. Evaluate the hazards and mitigate them, 2. Establish our Escape route, 3. Determine the lean of the tree, front to back and side to side, 4. Plan our cuts to put the tree safely where we wanted it to go.

We were graded on all four of the criteria as well as safety violations, i.e. proper starting of the

saw, use of chain brake, improper placement of the thumb, failure to use the face shield, hearing protection and chaps. The method taught us is the plunge or bore cut method. This is considered the safest way to drop a tree in most cases. Bill set a target fifty or so feet from the tree and we lost points for every foot we were off target. All of us got pretty close, or hit the target.

It was a fun and highly informative day. Everyone was extremely glad to have spent the day on such a worthwhile event. About all of us are waiting to take the next level on February 12.

The Game of Logging (GOL) is widely acknowledged as the premier timber harvesting training program in the country, offering hands on training in a competitive environment.
